Faculty of Medicine

In 1883, the University of Manitoba's Faculty of Medicine began when 13 Manitoba physicians and one school inspector came together to organize the first medical school in Western Canada. Today, the faculty is composed of 26 academic departments, institutes and administrative units, including the School of Medical Rehabilitation, which includes occupational, physical and respiratory therapy. Canada's first university-based graduate-level physician assistant program, housed in the Faculty of Medicine, was launched in 2008.

Each department is involved in teaching, research, service and clinical activities, with an academic staff of approximately 600 full-time and 1,025 part-time faculty, approximately 350 research associates, a support staff of nearly 400 and a student population of 1,550.

More than 950 applicants apply to the Faculty of Medicine each year and, at 110 students, the class of 2012 is the largest medical class in Manitoba's history.

The faculty's mission is three-fold: 1) to develop, deliver and evaluate high-quality educational programs for undergraduate and postgraduate medical students, practising physicians, physician assistants, students of medical rehabilitation, graduate students and postdoctoral fellows; 2) to conduct research and other scholarly inquiry into the basic and applied medical sciences; and 3) to provide advice, disseminate information to health professionals and plan for the development and delivery of health care services.

The faculty also supports the success of Aboriginal students in the health professions through the Centre for Aboriginal Health Education. Working in partnership with several health-related faculties and schools at the University of Manitoba, the centre offers mentorship, peer support, academic resources and professional development opportunities for Aboriginal students.
